BIA Sponsors Summer Youth Program

Menominee Trust Resources Director (and NCCE alumni) Chris Caldwell and Natural Resources Liaison Doug Eifler put their heads together this summer and came up with a Summer Youth Program sponsored by the Bureau of Indian Affairs. Three high-school students took part in the program at Menominee, working under the leadership of NCCE SCEP student Adrian Ackley. The students are Denise Dodge (left) the surveyor, Camilo Perez (bottom), the bear trapper and Darrin McPherson, (right) the tree-hugger.

The program started June 25 and the students attended Orientation and a ground-breaking ceremony for Historic Preservation; helped with a bear monitoring project; tallied, paced and took compass shots and basal areas for check plots in the timber marking areas; correctively pruned over 40 acres of white pine; surveyed culverts on forest roads with Environmental services; and eradicated an invasive species (buckthorn) on one acre of land in a joint effort between Menominee Tribe and Menominee County. They also visited the University of Wisconsin – Madison and the USDA Forest Products Laboratory.




Eifler's to Botswana
